

The workshops will cover topics including: career mentorship, managing the student-supervisor relationship, planning for life after the doctorate and how this can all be assisted by new technology.

Facilitator: PROFESSOR DANIEL CAREY, Director of the Moore Institute, MRIA and Chair of the Irish Humanities Alliance



Professor Daniel Carey, MRIA, is Director of the Moore Institute for the Humanities and Social Studies at NUI Galway and Professor of English in the School of Humanities. He was educated at McGill University, TCD and Hertford College Oxford (D.Phil) and has had visiting fellowships at Glasgow, Columbia and Oxford. He has mentored eleven postdoctoral fellows (in the fields of English, History, French, and Politics) under funding schemes in Ireland, Britain and the EU, and has supervised five PhDs.

DR. ORLA MURPHY, MPhil, PhD, Lecturer, University College Cork



Orla researches and teaches in the Digital Arts and Humanities Program at UCC and in the National, inter-institutional DAH PhD program in Ireland. She is the Director of the innovative BA in Digital Humanities and Information Technology and is co-coordinator of the MA in Digital Arts and Humanities and the online MA program in Digital Cultures. Orla is interested in how culture is, was and will be communicated in all its forms including 3D representation, and how we read, represent and share knowledge in new networked, virtual environments and in awareness of gender the technological space. Using her vast experience in the area of digital humanities, Orla will discuss how the digital transforms the traditional supervisory paradigm.

DR SANDRA COLLINS, Director, Digital Repository of Ireland (DRI)



Dr Sandra Collins is the Director of the Digital Repository of Ireland (DRI). DRI is the Irish national trusted digital repository for humanities and social sciences data. Sandra is also a Funded Investigator in Insight: Ireland's National Data Analytics Research Centre and Co-PI on a large cross-disciplinary Irish Research Council project called Irish Records Linkage (IRL). As Director of the DRI, Sandra will discuss the national perspective on the preservation, discovery and access to cultural data.

DANIEL POWELL, Early Stage Researcher and Marie Skłodowska-Curie Fellow, King's College London

Daniel Powell is an Early Stage Researcher and Marie Skłodowska-Curie Fellow affiliated with the European Commission's Digital Scholarly Editing Initial Training Network (DIXIT). He is also a third year doctoral candidate in English at the University of Victoria in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, where he has worked extensively with the Electronic Textual Cultures Lab on a variety of digital humanities projects. Prior to these positions, he earned an MA in English with a concentration in Medieval and Early Modern Studies from the University of Victoria and an AB from the College of Charleston. Giving an Early Stage perspective, Daniel will present on the '21st Century Dissertation/Thesis Topics'.
